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Overview:



In the lead up to this state election, we can work together to look after every Victorian child. We can make sure the incoming government prioritises children.

Children need to be placed at the centre of everything we do. As a community we have a duty of care to make sure our children grow up in safe, stable home environments, connected to family, community and culture, with the care and support needed to advance their health, education, wellbeing and development.

Key Messages:

- The voices of disadvantaged children and young people are all too often ignored.
- Too many Victorian children and families are struggling.
- Demand for family and carer support services is growing at an unprecedented rate.
- The Victorian state government must act early to help children in need; support young people, their families, and carers; and fund what we know will deliver better results through evidence-based models and demand-driven funding.
- Education opportunities need to be prioritised and responsive to these needs.

Announcements so far:



- All parties have supported the Home Stretch campaign to extend the age of care from 18 to 21.
- The Andrews Government will invest almost \$5 billion in the next decade to deliver 15 hours per week of subsidised three-year-old kinder.
- The Andrews Government will fund a \$3.4 million expansion of the LOOKOUT program to help children in out-of-home care access kinder programs and transition to school.
- Homeless and disadvantaged Victorians can now travel for free on public transport under a 12-month government trial of weekly and monthly emergency relief tickets.
- The Andrews Government will invest \$49.5 million to fund an extra 100,000 hours of respite care each year, plus carers will receive half price travel on public transport, with free travel during Carers Week.
- The Andrews Government will invest \$209 million to build 1000 community and public housing properties.

This is a great start, but there is more to be done.

But Aboriginal children are still fifteen times more likely to end up in out-of-home care in Victoria. The next Victorian government must continue to grow funding for Aboriginal organisations to provide support for families to keep kids connected to kin, country and community.
